
### FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS FYE 2024



### **UNITED WAY ALICE PROJECT**

#### ALICE = Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed

Since 2016, the ALICE Report has shed light on the everyday struggles of North Idaho households that are ALICE. In 2022, the ALICE in Focus Research Series found that **45%** of all children in Idaho live in families below the ALICE Threshold. More than 204,000 children!



## **60**% OF INFANTS IN IDAHO ARE BELOW THE ALICE THRESHOLD.

In 2023, an updated ALICE Report for Idaho was released. The study shows the number of individuals in poverty has remained steady, but the increase in population in Idaho has led to a much higher percentage of ALICE.


